Victoria Garloch, a junior at the Warwick High School, cares about people. In November 2011, aiming to offer a hot meal and fellowship to individuals and families needing either, she initiated the Warwick Community Kitchen as part of her Girl Scout Gold Award project. Too big a project for just one person, Victoria elicited the assistance of her parents, Carrie and David, her sister, Rebecca, fellow Girl Scout Troop members, and volunteers from the community.
Since the first meal, volunteers

under Victoria's guidance have continued preparing and serving meals every month at the Pine Island Ele-mentary School as part of a ministry of the Vision Community Church. Victoria and her parents decide on the menu. If they have a sponsor, they work with them determining what will be served. All the monthly meals are prepared on the premises, with exception of the two Thanksgiving dinners, where the facilities of the Sugar Loaf Firehouse and the Pine Island Polish Legion were used in 2011 and 2012, respectively.

When guests arrived for the most

recent dinner on Fri., Apr. 26, Victoria shared some facts about the importance of fighting childhood hunger, with the help of two large posters designed by Victoria's mom. In addition to the meal, other activities help to make the event special. Every month, guests celebrating their birthday are recognized and greeted with the Happy Birthday song and a beautiful cake. Most recently, an Easter egg hunt was conducted, where children gathered plastic eggs filled with

Victoria made a point to explain that the Community Dinners are not just about feeding those who might be hungry, saying, "I don't consider these dinners as Soup Kitchens where people who do not have money come to eat. I consider these dinners as one big, happy, family meal where every-one comes together, sits down, and enjoys each other's company. Humanitarian Efforts Gain Wider Attention Victoria's good deeds gained the attention of those outside of Pine Island, as she was recently

awarded the Orange County Human Rights Commission Award, which cited her humanitarian efforts addressing the needs of the community. Victoria also received the Sodexo Youth Foundation Grant which will provide funding to help her with some of the costs incurred maintaining the kitchen.

Glenn and Susan Dickes, who are matching the grant received by Victoria, said, "The grant was awarded by the Sodexo Youth Foundation in recognition of the quality of Victoria's application in a strongly competitive environment.
